3. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed for the students of USTH to improve their English from the listening level equivalent to 4.5 IELTS. The course includes exercises and activities for students to develop language competence, language skills and testing techniques for questions in Reading test.

This course adopts learner-centered and communicative approaches.

The proficiency goal of this course is for the students to achieve at least Band 5.5 IELTS for listening skill.

4. COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon the completion of the course, students are expected to be able to

- 1. achieve at least 5.5 IELTS score;
- 2. understand the strategies to deal with IELTS Listening question types.

Course Prerequisites

In order to start their study in this course, students are supposed to have finished their English program at mainstream high schools in Vietnam, which also means that they

- have grasped certain vocabulary items of daily-life topics such as school and study, entertainment, environment, etc. which were presented in their high-school learning program.
- can read and understand short texts of 500-word length.
- are familiar to multiple choice question type.

Supplementary texts and materials are also included in the study pack for ease of reference. Detailed instructions and requirements on how to use and what to do with supplementary materials are to be given by individual lecturer.

Book requirement for students:

Students also have e-copies of these materials (WITHOUT answer key). Students are required to prepare for their own hard copies. If students do not bring hard copies to class, they will be marked as absent for that class.

6. COURSE POLICY

- Attendance Policy: Students who are absent for 2 sessions onwards will merit an automatic failure.
- No late submission or task completion is accepted, unless otherwise approved by the teacher at least ONE week before the deadline. Late submission will occur in 20% reduction of the allotted grade for each day late.
- Completion of all assignments is required as the condition to sit for the final test

• Technology and Media:

Email: Students can submit their home writing to the lecturer via email if allowed by him/her. **Laptop Usage**: Students can use their laptops during the lecture to look up for new words, or to type their writing (as required by lecturer). However, they will be asked to leave the classroom

immediately and marked as absent on that day if found using laptops for any purpose unrelated to that particular studying session.

9. UNDERSTAND THE READING TEST

You will need to read quickly and efficiently, and manage your time

You will be asked to read three different passages and respond to related questions in your IELTS Reading test.

The content of the Reading test is different for <u>IELTS Academic and IELTS General Training</u> tests. Details of each version are given below.

Purpose of the test

The IELTS Reading test is designed to assess a wide range of reading skills, including how well you

- read for the general sense of a passage
- read for the main ideas
- read for detail
- understand inferences and implied meaning
- recognise a writer's opinions, attitudes and purpose
- follow the development of an argument

This is the case for whichever version of the IELTS test you are taking.

Timing

The IELTS Reading test takes 60 minutes. You are not allowed any extra time to transfer your answers, so write them directly on to your answer sheet. You will need to manage your time during the test because you will not be told when to start or finish each section.

Three sections

You will be given three different passages to read, each with accompanying questions. You can expect to read 2,150 - 2,750 words in total during your test.

IELTS Academic Reading test

There are three sections to the IELTS Academic Reading test, and each contains one long text.

These are taken from books, journals, magazines and newspapers. They have been written for a non-specialist audience and are on academic topics of general interest. They range from the descriptive and factual to the discursive and analytical.

Each text might be accompanied by diagrams, graphs or illustrations, and you will be expected to show that you understand these too. A simple glossary is provided if the material contains technical terms.

Questions

There are 40 questions.

A variety of question types is used. You may be asked to

 fill gaps in a passage of written text or in a table/ match headings to written text to diagrams or charts/ complete sentences/ give short answers to open questions/ answer multiple choice questions

Sometimes you will need to give one word as your answer, sometimes a short phrase, and sometimes simply a letter, number or symbol.

Make sure you read the instructions carefully.

Marking

Each correct answer receives one mark. Scores out of 40 are converted to the IELTS 9-band scale. Scores are reported in whole and half bands.

IELTS Academic Reading marking schemes

For the *academic* reading test, which also contains 40 questions, but is more difficult, the *approximate* band scores can be calculated using this table.
